A self-guided activity to do anytime!

Nance Family Beginnings

James Solomon "Big Jim" Nance, Jr. grew up in a segregated neighborhood in Indiana County PA, called "Chevy Chase." He was one of 10 children (6 boys, 4 girls) raised under the guidance and instruction of caring parents. His father, James Solomon Nance, Sr., born in North Carolina, moved to Florida where he worked in a meat packing plant before migrating to West Virginia during the depths of the Great Depression (1931), and eventually to Indiana County (1933) for work in coal mining. Here he found a home in Chevy Chase Heights, a job in a local coal mine, and a wife--Delia James of Josephine, Indiana County.

Although mining became Nance Sr.'s primary source of income for the rest of his life, he was able to supplement his earnings by purchasing low-cost houses, renovating and renting to others in need of housing. Jim and his brothers would assist their father in completing these restoration projects. While Nance Sr. labored in the coal mines, Delia Nance conducted the daily domestic tasks necessary for sustaining the needs of their large family.

Life in Indiana Borough & Chevy Chase Heights

Because of the discrimination they often experienced, many Chevy Chase residents would not go into Indiana Borough. Local barbers refused to give haircuts to black residents, only one tavern could be patronized by people of color, and the local swimming pool at Mack Park was segregated.

High School & College

At Indiana High School, Jim was the first African American to be elected class president. He participated in a "do-whop" singing group and excelled in football, track and wrestling, where he became the first African American two-time state heavyweight champion in PA history in 1960, winning again in 1961. In Track & Field, Jim was a PIAA qualifier in shot put and won various County Track & Field events. In football, Jim played on the state's "Big 33" football team.

Jim received 11 division one college offers, but ultimately chose to go to Syracuse University because his idol Jim Brown was an alumnus and the school had a rich running back tradition. He became their star fullback, and in 1965 Jim played in the Syracuse vs. LSU Sugar Bowl. Despite his football coach's fear of injury, Jim also continued to wrestle and in 1963 and 1965 he became the first two-time African American NCAA champion with a record of 91 and 1.

American Football League Career (AFL)

After graduating from Syracuse, Jim was drafted by the Chicago Bears (NFL) and the Boston Patriots (AFL). Initially he wanted to sign with the Bears but was told he could not bring his fiancée with him because she was white. Never a man to be intimidated, Jim refused their offer and signed a contract with the Patriots instead.

Jim set an AFL rushing record of 1,458 yards in 1966 and was named the league's most valuable player. Jim was named All-Star in 1967 when he became the only AFL player to have consecutive seasons with over 1,000 yards, this time 1,216. Jim was the Patriots' all-time leader in rushing touchdowns with 45, a record he still holds, and was sixth on the Patriot's career scoring list. He caught 133 passes for 870 yards and one touchdown. In 1972 Jim was traded to the Philadelphia Eagles but he refused to play for them and temporarily retired until he joined the New York Jets the following year.

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World Football League Career (WFL)

Two years after joining the Jets, Jim played with the Houston Texans/Shreveport Steamer of the World Football League (WFL), rushing for 1,240 yards. In 1975, he ran for 767 yards before the WFL folded. He is the all-time leading rusher in the WFL with 490 carries for 2,007 yards and a 4.1 average, and rushed 15 touchdowns during his WFL career.


Legacy of Jim Nance


In 1969 during his time with the AFL, Jim was one of a group of pro-football players selected to accompany Bob Hope to travel to Vietnam on a mission to encourage Gl's in the field. Throughout his whole career, Jim sponsored and organized many youth sports programs in the Boston area. He was a featured speaker at sports banquets in Indiana County and often met with football players and students at Indiana Area High School.

Jim Nance Jr. passed away in 1992. He was laid to rest in Oakland Cemetery in White Township. Jim is survived by four sisters, one brother, and a daughter.

In 2009 Jim was inducted into the New England Patriots Hall of Fame, as well as the Indiana County PA Sports Hall of Fame and the Pennsylvania Wrestling Hall of Fame.

In 2013 the PA State Legislature passed legislation SB 1097 and HB 1665 to designate a state road in his honor. The "James Nance Memorial Highway" includes a segment of 5th Street beginning at Philadelphia St. in Indiana Borough and ending in Chevy Chase Heights. A sign commemorating Jim Nance stands outside the Indiana County Courthouse.





Walking Route Points of Interest

This walk takes place along James Nance Memorial Highway, starting in his home neighborhood.

- Start at Chevy Chase Community Center, which is located down the street from Jim's parents house.
- **Kennedy-King Park** offers outdoor recreation to the Chevy Chase community. The proposed expansion of the Park includes environmental, recreational, and educational stormwater management features.
- The Chevy Chase Food Forest was created to educate, build community, and provide food security. Garden plots are available for rent to any interested residents. This project and the expansion of Kennedy-King Park demonstrate the commitment of community members to the growth of Chevy Chase Heights.
- The High School Track Field is where Jim would have competed during his High School years in Track & Field.
- Indiana Area Junior High School used to be the Indiana High School, where Jim would have attended classes, participated in clubs, sports, and student leadership, and graduated.
